Program Coordinator Report

Old timers in the Oregon wine community like me remember a seminal event in the history of Oregon wine that almost certainly helped to create the robust wine industry of today. In 1991, a group of wine industry leaders and OSU research faculty met at the Silver Falls Conference Center for two and a half days to brainstorm and hammer out a research strategic plan that would guide grape and wine improvement in the future. At that time, viticulture and enology research at OSU consisted of Porter Lombard, Steve Price, and Barney Watson, and there were probably about 50 wineries and a thousand or so acres of vineyards in the state.

Since then, the wine industry has grown and matured immensely. At OWRI we have at any one time 15-20 research and extension faculty working on wine and grape related issues, and we recently added economics and business. Yet, for a dynamic and competitive industry such as wine, in Oregon and elsewhere, and a priori value is that we seek to continuously improve the quality, productivity and sustainability of grapes and wines produced in Oregon. In order to do so, leadership in all areas from industry to academia need to create a vision of what the future of the wine industry looks like, and how research and extension can help it to achieve its objectives. To my knowledge, no metrics were gathered after Silver Falls, and one may argue that the results speak for themselves. But there was an assumption among the participants that it was a valuable exercise that delivered a positive outcome.

The research leaders at the Oregon Wine Board have proposed another research retreat in November. In order to gather valuable industry research opinion, they are hosting research listening sessions around the state next week. At OWRI, the results of this process could help inform our research agenda as we move forward, and allow us to better serve the wine industry. If you care about research and the progress of the wine industry, we hope you will participate in a focus group meeting in your area.
