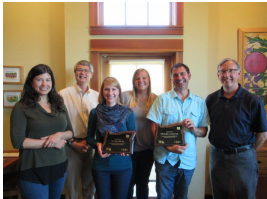

Program Coordinator Update



It was a pleasure recently to honor the owners and production team at Stoller Family Estate and Dr. Patty Skinkis, OSU statewide viticulture extension specialist for ten years of research collaboration. OWRI faculty rely heavily on industry cooperators for assistance in conducting their research. Because the research is done in a commercial vineyard or winery, the results are often viewed by growers and wine makers as more compelling than work done in a lab or greenhouse, though both settings have their necessity and purpose. The kinds of work performed vary tremendously, from gathering insects that may be disease vectors, to all nature of vineyard management practices, trapping fungal spores, or determining the most effective irrigation scheduling, and understanding the genetic differences between Pinot noir clones. We know that growers and wine makers have a lot on their plate each day, and to pay close attention to the research parameters set by our faculty is an added task and responsibility, and even a small mistake can possibly compromise the results of the experiment. Our collaborators tend to be detail-oriented and intellectually curious about what is happening in their vineyard and cellar, beyond what they observe, but also wish to understand. We have never calculated the in-kind monetary value of the time, facilities, and resources that collaborators have devoted to OWRI research and extension efforts, but it would certainly be enormous. But the greatest value may be that growers and wine makers are in direct contact with our research faculty in their fields and cellars, talking about challenges and sharing information and ideas, and assuring that research and extension will continue to play a vital role in the improvement of Oregon's grapes and wines. Unravelling the Mysteries of Cold Soaking Workshop

While cold soaking is a process that many winemakers employ during the production of Pinot noir wine, the impact of this technique on wine quality and how to manage this process is relatively unknown. Join us for this half-day workshop where we will examine the winemaking technique of cold soaking and discuss some of the latest research investigating the role of grape microflora during cold soaking.

Topics to be covered include:

- History of the cold soaking process in Burgundy
- Impact of yeast present during cold soaking on Pinot noir wine volatiles
- Utilizing non-Saccharomyces yeast to prevent spoilage issues during cold soaking
- Tastings of cold soak trial wines
